HISTORY OF THE BOSTON PSYCHOANALYTIC SOCIETY AND INSTITUTE

Psychoanalytic study began in Boston in the early 1900's when a group of physicians, philosophers and psychologists met regularly to discuss the ideas of Freud, Janet, Bleuler, Bernsheim and others. By 1928 an informal psychoanalytic society had been formed. Within three years a full training program was instituted under the impetus of a group of young clinicians who had recently returned from study in Berlin and Vienna, and in 1933 the Boston Psychoanalytic Society and Institute became a formally recognized member of the American Psychoanalytic Association.

From the beginning, the Institute devoted itself to the training of psychoanalysts, and the Society served the continuing education and professional needs of its members, as well as offering seminars in related subjects to the community. Psychoanalytic training has traditionally been composed of three parts: personal analysis, seminars, and individually supervised clinical experience.

The first training program began in 1932 with a student body of six. Now about one hundred thirty psychiatrists, psychologists, social workers and other mental health professionals are students in the psychoanalytic training program of the Boston Psychoanalytic Society and Institute. Over one hundred patients are in treatment with these students in low-fee supervised analyses. Over eighty members actively participate as psychoanalytic training faculty.

Society membership has increased from the original ten of 1932 to over three hundred fifty members today. Many members have been actively engaged in teaching, research, and administrative positions in other institutions in the area. Society activities include the Program in Psychoanalytic Studies, which offers a broad range of courses to allied professionals, the three-year Advanced Training in Psychoanalytic Psychotherapy, the one-year Fellowship in Psychoanalytic Psychotherapy, monthly scientific meetings, seminars, peer workshops, and larger conferences.

The training, postgraduate and continuing education programs are accredited by the Accreditation Council for Continuing Medical Education through the American Psychoanalytic Association, the American Psychological Association, and for individual programs for social workers, the Massachusetts Chapter of the NASW.

The Boston Psychoanalytic Alliance was established in 1998 as a division of the Boston Psychoanalytic Society and Institute. The Alliance is committed to the development of collaborative programs that will contribute to the community-at-large and works with organizations in the Greater Boston area. The Alliance offers a Speakers Bureau as part of its interface with the community.



THE TRAINING OF PSYCHOANALYSTS ADMISSIONS PROCEDURES

The Boston Psychoanalytic Society and Institute, Inc., 15 Commonwealth Avenue, Boston, Massachusetts 02116, does not discriminate on the basis of race, creed, color, sex, age, sexual orientation, national origin or handicap in admissions, administration of its educational programs, scholarship and loan programs, or employment. The Institute is subject to Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, as amended, Title XI of the Education Amendments of 1972, and The Age Discrimination Act of 1975 and the relevant regulations of 45 CER Parts 80, 84, 86 and 90.

APPLICATION

Questions concerning application procedures may be directed to the Chair of the Admissions Committee.

APPLICATION FORMS - These may be obtained from the Administrative Director. Information about the applicant's education, professional experience and letters of reference is requested, together with authorization for the Institute to contact institutions or individuals by whom the applicant is known

INTERVIEWS - The applicant will then be requested to have three or more interviews with members of the Admissions Committee.

NOTIFICATION - Applications are processed as received, and the applicant is notified as soon as action has been taken usually within one month of completing interviews. Medical applicants, non-medical therapists with a Ph.D. in Psychology, Psy.D., Doctor of Mental Health (D.M.H.), and Ph.D. or M.S.W. in Social Work, and Research Fellow candidates can be accepted directly. To assure review of these applications in time for matriculation the following fall, they must be received by April 1.

REAPPLICATION - An applicant who is not accepted may reapply, generally after three years. Exceptions may be made in individual instances.

ARRANGEMENTS TO BEGIN TRAINING - When an applicant is accepted as a candidate, he or she is expected to arrange for a training analysis with one of the training analysts selected from a list provided by the Institute, and to notify the Administrative Director of such arrangements. Training may start any time following acceptance; however, a candidate is required to have begun a training analysis prior to or concurrent with beginning seminars and within two years of the date of acceptance, unless an extension is granted by the Education Committee.

The applicant who is accepted for full clinical training in psychoanalysis is expected neither to represent him or herself as a psychoanalyst nor to practice psychoanalysis until authorized to do so by an approved Institute of the American Psychoanalytic Association.

All candidates for full clinical training are required to carry malpractice insurance throughout training.

SELECTION

The Education Committee decides upon an individual's application for psychoanalytic training at the Boston Psychoanalytic Institute. Its selection is based upon an assessment of the maturity of personality, the integrity of character, intellectual honesty, clinical skills, scientific interest, aptitude for psychological and scientific work, and the quality of work in having fulfilled the academic and professional requirements outlined below.

CATEGORIES OF TRAINING

The categories of candidates are as follows and are described below:

- I. **FULL CLINICAL TRAINING**
 - 1. Full Clinical Training
 - 2. Research Fellows who have been granted a Research Waiver

- II. **PARTIAL TRAINING**
 - 1. Special Research Fellows
 - 2. Affiliate Scholars
 - 3. Guest Candidates

I. FULL CLINICAL TRAINING

Individuals who have graduated from an accredited post baccalaureate degree-based clinical mental health educational program. This must be either a doctoral level degree or a clinical masters degree recognized as the highest clinical degree generally obtained within a specific mental health profession, supplemented with additional didactic and clinical training. This education must entail full immersion in a rigorous, organized, didactic curriculum, a portion of which includes psychodynamic seminars, all of which is accompanied by an organized and supervised clinical training experience. The overall goal of such an education should be to teach the student to conceptualize mental illness in terms of the biological, psychological, and socio-cultural factors that determine normal and abnormal behavior. The education should also teach the students to gather and organize data about a mental health situation, integrate data with a comprehensive formulation of the problem which supports a well reasoned differential diagnosis, a treatment plan, an implementation of the treatment plan, and a follow-up.

The program must also have provided the applicant with sufficient opportunities to develop not only knowledge and clinical skills, but also professionalism and professional principles. An individual whose mental health education and clinical experience included the above and who possess the degree of Doctor of Medicine or Doctor of Osteopathic Medicine, and is enrolled in or has completed a psychiatric residency training program, is eligible to apply for psychoanalytic education and clinical training. Mental health professionals who have completed a doctoral level degree from an accredited mental health clinical program who are licensed in the jurisdiction in which they practice such a Doctor of Philosophy in Psychology, Doctor of Philosophy in Counseling Psychology, Doctor of Psychology, Doctor of Education, Doctor of Philosophy in Social Work or Doctor of Mental Health are eligible to apply for psychoanalytic education and clinical training.

An individual whose mental health education and clinical experience includes the above prerequisites and who possesses the highest clinical degree of a specific mental health profession, such as a Master of Social Work complemented with peer review is eligible to apply if: 1) this education is supplemented with at least two years of additional post-graduate didactic and clinical training, or 2) if the individual, who already has an M.S.W. or M.F.C.C., is enrolled in and has completed at least two years of a doctoral level mental health educational program.

2. Research Fellows

These applicants consist of scientists, scholars, research psychiatrists and psychologists, educators and administrators with a strong research interest for whom psychoanalysis is a relevant discipline. They may matriculate as candidates in the category of Special Research Fellows (see below) and start course work and training analysis, but before undertaking supervised clinical work, on their behalf the Institute must apply for and be granted a Research Waiver by the American Psychoanalytic Association. After full clinical psychoanalytic training, these candidates may engage in the practice of psychoanalysis as a means of forwarding their career objectives. Applicants should request further information about this.

II. PARTIAL TRAINING

1. Special Research Fellows

These applicants consist of scientists, scholars, research psychiatrists and psychologists, educators and administrators with a strong research interest for whom psychoanalysis is a relevant discipline but who do not plan to pursue full clinical training or practice psychoanalysis. (If full clinical training is planned, the decision should ordinarily be made in advance and the applicant should qualify and apply for one of the full training categories.) These candidates take the full course load and are expected to have a training analysis. It is not expected that they will apply for a waiver, but if they decide in the course of training that they would like full clinical training they may be eligible then to apply for a Research Waiver.

2. Affiliate Scholars

This limited program is available to scholars with established academic credentials who wish to learn more about psychoanalysis to enhance knowledge and research endeavors in their own field. Affiliate scholars will be admitted for a term of one year, following which the scholar may apply for a one year renewal. Upon acceptance an advisor is assigned who will develop a course of instruction adapted to the needs, talents and level of psychoanalytic knowledge of each scholar. They may take seminars appropriate to their level of knowledge with the approval of both the advisor and the instructors and they may attend Scientific Meetings of the Society. Those interested may request further information.

3. Guest Candidates

This program is for candidates from other Institutes who are temporarily in Boston. They may take courses appropriate to their level of training with the approval of instructors.

TRANSFER OF CANDIDACY

Candidates in training at other Approved Institutes of the American Psychoanalytic Association may apply to for transfer of candidacy. Credit for training analysis, supervised analyses, or theoretical and clinical courses may be allowed at the discretion of the Education Committee for satisfactory work at another Institute or Training Center recognized by the American Psychoanalytic Association. Such credit can be given only to applicants who also fulfill the requirements for professional students of the Boston Psychoanalytic Institute.

TRAINING PROGRAM

The training program consists of (1) the personal training analysis, (2) the academic program of theoretical and clinical instruction, and (3) the individual supervision of the candidate's psychoanalysis of patients. It is recommended that analysis, seminars and supervised analyses of patients be concurrent to maximize the syncretic process of training.

The total educational program is carried on concomitantly with the candidate's other professional activities, such as hospital residency, teaching, research work, or psychotherapy practice. The length of the program varies individually, depending upon such factors as the progress made by the candidate in his or her training analysis, courses and supervised clinical work, and it varies over a period of 5 years or longer. The training analysis must begin by the fall of the year a candidate enrolls in seminars. Courses and seminars are mainly scheduled one or more evenings a week, and on Saturday mornings. Supervised clinical work requires at least four hours a week for each patient. Three cases, including patients of each sex and a minimum of 150 supervisory hours are required for graduation, 50 of which are required on the first case.

Confidentiality of personal communications, progress reports, and decisions in all aspects of training is carefully guarded.

TRAINING ANALYSIS

The personal analysis is a basic requirement for all subsequent professional education in psychoanalysis. It is conducted by a training analyst chosen by the candidate. The aim of the training analysis is to understand and master neurotic and personality problems and to free the candidate from unconscious attitudes that might interfere with psychoanalytic competence. It should provide first-hand experience of unconscious forces and resistances, free association, transference, working-through, and termination, and it should assist in developing self-analytic skills. It will be conducted at least four times a week. The duration of the analysis is determined by the personal therapeutic needs and individual progress of the candidate. In any case, it must be conducted through part of the candidate's own supervised experience in analyzing patients.

ACADEMIC PROGRAM

Theoretical and clinical instruction consists of required and elective courses and seminars. Required courses include three years of Adult Clinical Conferences and two years of Continuous Case Seminars. Candidates are eligible to enroll in these seminars provided that they will have begun their training analyses by or in the fall of the academic year of the First Year Courses. Promotion to succeeding seminar years follows upon the candidate's satisfactory progress in course work and upon approval of the Students Committee.

SUPERVISED CLINICAL WORK

The Education Committee determines the candidate's readiness for this phase of the training program. The candidate must have completed at least part of the first year of seminars and have professional licensure in this state. The candidate is then approved to undertake the analysis of a suitable patient with supervision with a Supervising Analyst.

The candidate selects a supervising analyst, other than the personal training analyst, from a list of supervisors provided by the Institute. The arrangements regarding the time schedule and fees are made privately between the candidate and the supervising analyst.

All supervised analytic patients are reviewed by the BPSI Consultation Committee. Many candidates are finding control analytic patients from their own practice and through referrals on an informal basis. This process involves evaluations by the candidate and supervisor and may include clinical. The final selection of patients is under the supervision of the BPSI Consultation Committee. Through their interviews and the brochure provided these patients have been informed of the conditions of entering treatment with a candidate.

Approval for a second case requires the recommendation of the supervising analyst after six months of analysis with the first case. Approval for a third case requires a written report on case #1 after at least one year in analysis and on case #2 after six months in analysis; written recommendations of the supervising analyst are also required. Reports on all supervised cases are required for graduation.

A minimum of three supervised analyses, with a total of at least 150 hours of supervision, must be treated by the candidate. At least 50 hours of consultation with the supervising analyst are required for one case. These supervised sessions are usually held on a weekly basis.

UNSUPERVISED CLINICAL WORK

Upon approval by the Students and Education Committees, candidates whose work is considered superior as recommended by a supervising analyst are eligible, after completing 120 hours or more of cases, to conduct the analysis of additional cases prior to graduation without Institute supervision.

GRADUATION

Candidates in Full Clinical Training These candidates are qualified for graduation from the Institute and active membership in the Boston Psychoanalytic Society and Institute when they have met the requirements of the "Standards for Training in Psychoanalysis" of the American Psychoanalytic Association. Requirements for graduation include (1) a training analysis of at least 300 hours, (2) conducting one supervised analysis with at least 50 hours of supervision, (3) conducting at least 2 other supervised analyses with a total accumulation of at least 150 hours of supervision, these supervised analyses involving both male and female patients, (4) at least 3 case presentations at adult clinical seminars, (5) case reports on all supervised cases, (6) attending the required theoretical and clinical courses, and (7) proving to have measured up to the assessments and expectations upon which original selection for training was based.

Upon graduation from full training a member of the Boston Psychoanalytic Society and Institute is eligible for membership in the American Psychoanalytic Association.

Special Research Fellows Special research fellows are qualified for graduation and Affiliate Membership in the Boston Psychoanalytic Society and Institute when they have satisfactorily completed the training analysis, the required theoretical and clinical courses and brought to a suitable stage whatever other parts of their training program they and the Education Committee will have decided on together.

Affiliate Membership Affiliate membership may also be granted to certain candidates for full clinical training who for various reasons do not complete that training but in the judgment of the Education Committee have satisfactorily completed enough of their training to qualify for this membership.

INTERRUPTION OR TERMINATION OF CANDIDACY

The progress of all candidates during training is subject at all times to review by the Education Committee, which reserves the right to specify additional training or to terminate candidacy if in its opinion a student has not demonstrated the necessary qualifications and/or competence in psychoanalysis. This decision is based on grounds of a) unsatisfactory progress; b) unsatisfactory ethical conduct; or c) personality traits which render the candidate unsuited for the practice of psychoanalysis. In each instance, the candidate is informed and consulted in the process leading to this decision.

LOAN AND SCHOLARSHIP FUNDS

Financial assistance is available to candidates according to merit and need, to be used only for financing psychoanalytic training.

A candidate is eligible for a loan or scholarship after completing at least six months of the training analysis.

Except in unusual circumstances the maximum loan is \$3,000 in an academic year. All applications must be approved by the Education Committee.

Loans are subject to 5% interest rate when granted and are payable in full one year after graduation or discontinuation of candidacy. One year after graduation or discontinuation of candidacy, if the loan is not paid in full, the interest rate will be increased to the current rate for personal loans at Bank of America. Veterans under the GI Bill may apply directly to the Veterans Administration (John F. Kennedy Building, Government Center, Boston, MA 02203) for benefits.

FEES

An application fee of \$145 must accompany each application.

Enrollment fee of \$450 is payable when the applicant is accepted as a candidate in training.

Current tuition fees for courses and seminars are \$2,423 yearly for candidates for full clinical training to be charged beginning with Seminar Year I for six years; Years VII and beyond are charged a registration fee of \$1,044 per year. Candidates for partial training pay the tuition fee for 5 years.

Fees for training analysis and supervision are arranged individually between the candidate and the analyst concerned.

Tuition fees are billed semi-annually prior to each semester and are to be paid before the semester begins. Fees cannot be refunded. Fees are subject to change. Satisfactory discharge of financial obligations is required for graduation.

TRAINING PROGRAM IN CHILD AND ADOLESCENT PSYCHOANALYSIS

APPLICATION

Graduate psychoanalysts or candidates in training at the Boston Psychoanalytic Society and Institute, graduates and candidates of the Psychoanalytic Institute of New England, East, and graduates of the Massachusetts Institute for Psychoanalysis who wish to specialize in the psychoanalysis of children and adolescents are required to attend designated seminars and to carry out supervised analyses with children and adolescents. When an application for this training is approved by the Committee on Child Analysis, it is sent to the Education Committee for final action.

The Committee on Child Analysis favors early entrance into the Child Analysis Program. A candidate may apply for this training any time after completing 6 months to a year with his or her first supervised adult case. Training in child and adolescent analysis can then be commenced concurrently with training in the adult program.

PREREQUISITES

One year of full-time child training in a recognized center is required for consideration of application to the Child Analysis program. This experience must have been supplemented by supervised work with children in a variety of settings such as pediatric services, schools and day-care centers, or by further child training and subsequent clinical experience with children and adolescents. The aim of this requirement is that the child analyst trainee "shall have gained considerable familiarity with the psychology, development and diagnosis of normal and pathological conditions of children".

At the time the applicant is considered for admission to the Child Analysis program, the applicant will discuss with a member of the Committee on Child Analysis the nature, range and adequacy of the applicant's professional experience with children and adolescents.

PROGRAM

The following studies are required of the Child Analysis trainees:

SUPERVISED ANALYSES - at least three children, one of latency age, the others to include a Pre-school and an adolescent boy or girl. Children of both sexes are to be included in the supervised experience, and one case is to be brought to a satisfactory conclusion prior to graduation.

1. *Supervision*: One hundred and fifty hours of supervision are required, sixty hours of which shall be obtained through weekly supervision of the first case. Thereafter, the supervisors and trainee will arrange the frequency of the supervision, depending upon the complexities of the particular child analysis and the trainee's progress. Each trainee shall work with at least two difference supervisors.

The clinical progress of the trainee is followed in regular meetings of the Committee on Child Analysis, for which supervisors prepare written reports.

2. *Case Reports*: For each case an initial report should be submitted six months after the analysis has begun; a progress report should be submitted every six months thereafter, and a final report or summary note should be submitted within three months after the termination of the case. The Committee on Child Analysis may elect to alter the frequency or nature of reports for pedagogical reasons in individual cases.

SEMINARS - A four-year program of seminars is required for trainees in child analysis. Newly accepted trainees are eligible to enroll in the seminar sequence upon approval by the Committee on Child Analysis.

Although the content of the courses and seminars may vary according to the needs of the candidates and the interests of the instructors, the seminars will provide instruction in all relevant aspects of child development and psychopathology and in the theory and techniques of child analysis.

GRADUATION

When the Committee on Child Analysis considers a trainee ready for graduation from the program, a recommendation to that effect is brought to the Education Committee, which certifies the trainee as a Graduate Psychoanalyst of Children and Adolescents of the Boston Psychoanalytic Society and Institute, Inc.

CANDIDATES COUNCIL

The Candidates Council includes student representatives from each seminar year. The Council considers all issues related to student interests and communicates these to appropriate training bodies. Its representatives serve on the Curriculum Committee, on the Program Committee of the Society, on the Board of Trustees, and on those ad hoc committees relevant to their interests. The council maintains a liaison with the Council for the Advancement of Psychoanalytic Education (CAPE).

THE PROGRAM IN PSYCHOANALYTIC STUDIES

The Program in Psychoanalytic Studies offers courses to the mental health, professional, and academic communities that teach, explore, and develop areas of psychoanalytic understanding. The goal of the Program is to enrich our understanding of clinical and theoretical psychoanalysis as well as to explore the interface between psychoanalysis and intellectual and social issues of concern to the community.

The flexibility of the Program in Psychoanalytic Studies makes it an ideal structure for members and candidates who wish to develop courses or seminars based on personal psychoanalytic interests. All members and candidates interested in teaching are encouraged to contact the Extension Program Committee.

The current course offerings are described in a separate brochure, available to the public through the Administrative Office.

ADVANCED TRAINING PROGRAM IN PSYCHOANALYTIC PSYCHOTHERAPY

This three-year program offers a series of integrated seminars and case supervision by senior clinicians leading toward a sophisticated understanding of the clinical techniques and the theoretical complexities of psychoanalytic psychotherapy. The coordinated seminars will offer a rigorous exploration of the clinical encounter and the therapeutic process.

The program is open to mental health professionals who have demonstrated skill and aptitude for psychoanalytic psychotherapy. Clinicians from the fields of psychiatry, psychology, social work, counseling, and psychiatric nursing will be considered for admissions. Students who have completed the work satisfactorily will be awarded a Certificate in Advanced Psychotherapy from the Program in Psychoanalytic Studies of the Boston Psychoanalytic Society and Institute, Inc.

ADVANCED TRAINING PROGRAM IN CHILD AND ADOLESCENT PSYCHOANALYTIC PSYCHOTHERAPY

The Child and Adolescent Advanced Training Program (CAATP) is an outgrowth of the Advanced Training Program which was established in 1979. The goal of the CAATP is to fulfill a need for advanced training in psychoanalytically informed psychotherapy of children and adolescents. The orientation of the Program is the development, through scholarship and clinical practice, of the advanced knowledge required to conduct psychoanalytic psychotherapy.

FELLOWSHIP IN PSYCHOANALYTIC PSYCHOTHERAPY

The Fellowship is a one-year program designed to enhance participants' grasp of the principles and practice of psychoanalytic psychotherapy. It is also well suited for clinicians considering more extensive training in psychoanalytic psychotherapy or training in psychoanalysis, but who are either uncertain or not yet ready for a multi-year training commitment.

The Fellowship is designed especially for mental health clinicians who have completed or are in an advanced phase of their requisite clinical training (psychiatric residency, psychology internship, MSW, Masters in psychiatric nursing, etc.) and who desire further didactic and clinical education in psychoanalytic psychotherapy.

FELLOWSHIP IN CHILD PSYCHOANALYTIC PSYCHOTHERAPY

The Child Fellowship Program offers participants an intensive, one year course of study in psychoanalytic approaches to child and adolescent psychotherapy. The curriculum includes both a theoretical course and a clinical course to be taught weekly. The theory courses will introduce the fundamentals of child analytic theories and will review historical as well as modern theoretical approaches. The clinical courses are organized around different developmental stages of childhood.

MEMBERSHIP IN THE BOSTON PSYCHOANALYTIC SOCIETY

There are ten types of membership in the Boston Psychoanalytic Society and Institute: Honorary, Active, Affiliate, Affiliate Scholar, Senior, Corresponding, Candidate, BPSI-PINE Reciprocal Non-Voting, Psychotherapist Members, Student Psychotherapist Members, Academic Associate Members and Student Academic Associate Members.

1. HONORARY MEMBERS

Psychoanalysts who have rendered distinguished service to the science of psychoanalysis may be nominated by the Membership Committee and elected by written ballot to honorary membership by a two-thirds majority of the Active and Affiliate Members present and voting.

2. ACTIVE MEMBERS

a. Active Members. Graduates of the Boston Psychoanalytic Institute are automatically admitted to active membership in the Boston Psychoanalytic Society and Institute, Inc., upon graduation. The Secretary of the Education Committee shall transmit each graduate's credentials and qualifications to the Chairperson of the Membership Committee and/or to the President of the Society-Institute at the time of graduation.

b. Active Members (Research). Graduates of the Research Fellow Program of the Boston Psychoanalytic Institute who have completed the full course of theoretical and clinical training are automatically admitted to active membership (Research) in the Boston Psychoanalytic Society and Institute, Inc., upon graduation.

Graduates of other Institutes affiliated with the American Psychoanalytic Association or graduates of Institutes affiliated with the International Psycho-Analytical Association, whose qualifications and credentials have been reviewed and approved by the Education Committee, may be nominated by the Membership Committee of the Boston Psychoanalytic Society and Institute, Inc. and elected by written ballot to active membership in the Boston Psychoanalytic Society and Institute, Inc. by two-thirds majority of the Active and Affiliate Members voting.

3. AFFILIATE MEMBERS

a. All Special Research Fellows who have fulfilled the requirements of the Boston Psychoanalytic Institute for training offered in the category are automatically admitted to Affiliate Membership in the Boston Psychoanalytic Society and Institute, Inc. upon graduation.

b. Individuals with equivalent qualifications, who are certified by other Institutes recognized by the American Psychoanalytic Association and whose credentials are reviewed and approved by the Education Committee, may be nominated and elected to affiliate membership in the Boston Psychoanalytic Society and Institute, Inc. by the same procedures set forth for Active Members in paragraph 2 of this Section.

c. Affiliate membership in the Boston Psychoanalytic Society and Institute, Inc. is also automatically granted to candidates in full clinical training who for various reasons do not complete full training but in the judgment of the Education Committee have satisfactorily completed enough of their training to qualify for this membership. In these cases the Education Committee transfers the candidacy to the status of partial training and then approves the candidate for graduation in that status.

4. AFFILIATE SCHOLAR MEMBERS

Outstanding individuals whose intellectual contributions and achievements are demonstrated and who may be expected to benefit psychoanalysis and the Society-Institute, may be selected by the Executive Council for nomination, and elected to Affiliate Scholar Membership in the Boston Psychoanalytic Society and Institute, Inc. by the same procedure as set forth for Active Members in paragraph 2 of this section (except for review of credentials by the Education Committee, since no specific credentials are required for this category of membership). Wherever in this Constitution the term Affiliate Member(s) appears it shall, without exception, be taken to include Affiliate Scholar Members.

5. SENIOR MEMBERS

Members of the Boston Psychoanalytic Society and Institute, Inc. in any category, who either (a) have attained the age of seventy (70) years or (b) have completed a period of thirty (30) years as Members of the Boston Psychoanalytic Society and Institute, Inc. in any category shall be known as Senior Members. Dues obligation for Senior Members will be on a stepped structure based on practice. All Senior Members who remain in full-time practice shall be expected to pay full annual dues. Senior Members in part-time practice shall be expected to pay one-half of active members dues. Dues shall be optional for Senior Members who are not in practice. Senior Members shall have the same status as other members in their membership category.

6. CORRESPONDING MEMBERS

Corresponding Membership shall, because of special circumstances, such as financial hardship, geographic distance, temporary or permanent illness and/or disability, double membership in Affiliate Societies, etc., be open to Members in good standing, upon request to the Membership Committee by that Member. Annual Dues for Corresponding Members shall be nominal. Corresponding Members shall have the same privileges as other Members, and shall be retained on a separate list from other membership categories; they shall receive, upon request, the following communications: (a) Monthly Calendar Programs; (b) President's Newsletter; (c) Annual Report; (d) Any other communications deemed by the President or the Member to be relevant and of special interest.

7. CANDIDATE MEMBERS

Candidates in good standing who have matriculated [enrolled as candidates] shall automatically be granted Candidate Member status. Candidate Members shall be eligible to serve on all committees unless ineligible according to the Bylaws and Constitution of the Boston Psychoanalytic Society and Institute. Candidate Members shall be eligible to attend all Business Meetings; Candidate Members shall be eligible to vote in all elections unless explicitly ineligible according to the Bylaws and Constitution of the Society-Institute. Candidate Membership shall not count towards the period of thirty years' dues payment for senior membership.

8. BPSI-PINE RECIPROCAL NON-VOTING MEMBERS

Active Members of the Psychoanalytic Society of New England, East (PSNE) are eligible to apply for non-voting membership in BPSI. Eligibility for non-voting membership shall be on confirmation of full membership status by the Psychoanalytic Society of New England, East. Dues shall be set by the Board of Trustees and as in all membership categories, be subject to annual cost of living increases. Non-voting Members are eligible to attend all Society meetings, but are not eligible to vote or hold office. Candidate Members of PSNE are eligible upon confirmation of membership status in PSNE for non-voting candidate membership in BPSI and subject to the same fees as BPSI Candidate Members.

9A. PSYCHOTHERAPIST MEMBERS

The Boston Psychoanalytic Society and Institute Advanced Training Program in Psychoanalytic Psychotherapy is a three-year certificate program for licensed clinicians in the mental health field. Graduates of the Boston Psychoanalytic Society and Institute Advanced Training Program and of the Child Advanced Training Program are automatically granted Psychotherapist Membership upon graduation. Psychotherapist Members are voting members of the Society. They will be eligible to serve on all Committees, unless ineligible according to the Bylaws and Constitution of the Boston Psychoanalytic Society and Institute. Dues are to be established by the Board of Trustees.

Two Psychotherapist Members shall be nominated by the Nominating Committee of the Society-Institute and elected by the membership to serve as members of the Executive Council.

9B. STUDENT PSYCHOTHERAPIST MEMBERS

Psychotherapy Members Students in good standing enrolled in the Advanced Training Program in Psychoanalytic Psychotherapy and of the Child ATP of the Boston Psychoanalytic Society and Institute, Inc. are, upon matriculation, automatically granted Student Psychotherapist Membership. Student Psychotherapist Members shall be a voting category of Membership. Dues are to be established by the Board of Trustees.

10A. ACADEMIC ASSOCIATE MEMBERS

Affiliate Scholars and Silberger Scholars are automatically granted Academic Associate Membership. Academic Associate Members are non-voting members of the Society. Dues are to be established by the Board of Trustees.

10B. STUDENT ACADEMIC ASSOCIATE MEMBERS

Students in good standing enrolled in the Boston Psychoanalytic Society and Institute Affiliate Scholar Program and Silberger Scholars are automatically granted Student Academic Associate Membership for the time they are so enrolled. Upon approval of the Board of Trustees, no dues are charged during the course of study.

CONTINUING EDUCATION

Members of the Boston Psychoanalytic Society and Institute, Inc., are eligible to attend any course of the Institute and Program in Psychoanalytic Studies with the approval of the individual instructor. Members of other Affiliate Societies of the American Psychoanalytic Association and of the Component Affiliate Societies of the International Psycho-Analytic Association are eligible to attend courses upon approval of the Education Committee.

Training in Psychoanalysis

Physicians: This activity has been planned and implemented in accordance with the Essential Areas and Policies of the Accreditation Council for Continuing Medical Education (ACCME) through the joint sponsorship of the American Psychoanalytic Association and the Boston Psychoanalytic Society and Institute. The American Psychoanalytic Association is accredited by the ACCME to provide continuing medical education for physicians and takes responsibility for the content, quality, and scientific integrity of this CME activity. The American Psychoanalytic Association designates this educational activity for a maximum of 100.5 hours in category I credit towards the AMA Physician's Recognition Award. Each physician should claim only those hours of credit that he/she actually spent in the educational activity.

Disclosure information is on record indicating that participating faculty members have no significant financial relationships to disclose.

Psychologists: The Boston Psychoanalytic Society and Institute is approved by the American Psychological Association to sponsor continuing education for psychologists.
